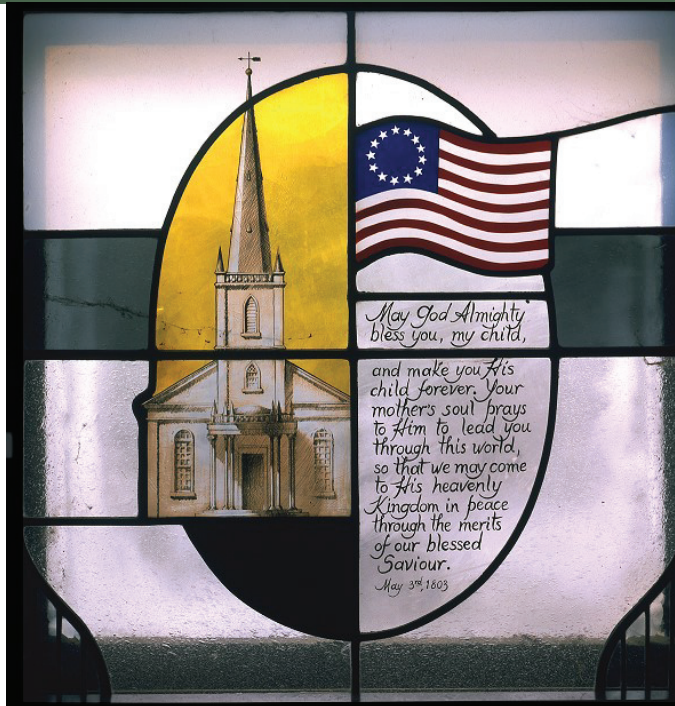

Contact a priest for ministry to the sick and aged at home or at a local healthcare facility. Upon request, Holy Communion will be brought to the seriously ill or homebound.

Confirmation

Baptized adults who have never received First Communion and/or Confirmation should contact a priest to complete their Christian Initiation through the R.C.I.A. process.

LIVING AS MISSIONARY DISCIPLES

In our parishes, we frequently hold a number of misconceptions about missionary discipleship that can seriously hinder our ability to grow life-giving and sustainable parishes.

BUSYNESS IS FRUITFULNESS - Many parishes fail to provide a clear and simple path to missionary discipleship. A parish must be organized in such a way that people can focus on becoming and making disciples. A parish that prioritizes the making of disciples needs constantly to communicate that vision so that everyone in the parish understands the 'more' they are invited to experience. We can unintentionally confuse people with invitations to multiple activities, courses, and groups, thereby failing to highlight the 'best thing' in the midst of too many 'good things.' A busy parish does not necessarily effectively grow disciples; faced with so many choices, many people get passionate about their mission, not THE mission. When you say 'no' to a hundred other missions, you say 'yes' to the most important mission. The clearer and simpler the path towards missionary discipleship is, the more people will travel it.

February 2nd

Feast of the Presentation + Candlemas

In keeping with the tradition, we will bless a representative number of candles for use in the church at the 9:00am Mass. Some of these candles will be used to give the blessing of throats on the Feast of Saint Blaise on February 3rd. You may bring candles from home to be blessed as well. Blessed candles are called "sacramental." According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC), paragraph 1667 introduces sacramentals: "Holy Mother Church has, moreover, instituted sacramentals. These are sacred signs which bear a resemblance to the sacraments. They signify effects, particularly of a spiritual nature, which are obtained through the intercession of the Church. By them men are disposed to receive the chief effect of the sacraments, and various occasions in life are rendered holy." Blessed candles, blessed medals, etc. are all objects which, having been blessed, confer blessings when they are used properly. (I.E., rosaries become sacramentals when blessed, and are used properly when you use them for praying; they are improperly used when they are worn for decoration.) In the past, most Catholic homes had blessed candles around. In fact, some homes had "Sick Call Sets," typically a large crucifix that would open up to let you store two blessed candles and holy water. The crucifix would fit into the base and you now had everything needed for a priest to give the Sacrament of the Sick. Many people like to burn blessed candles before icons or other pictures of saints; and there are "pious traditions" like burning blessed candles during severe storms, etc.

Special Mass In Honor of Our Lady of Lourdes With Eucharistic Blessing for Healing Friday, February 11th at 7:00PM



The message of Lourdes is the Gospel message. In all of the conversations between Our Lady and Bernadette at Massabielle, Mary calls humanity to rediscover the Good News that God loves and cares for us. No matter who we are, Christ is there for us. So it is not surprising that through the years, Lourdes has often become synonymous with the physically sick. At the grotto, there is a message of great hope and consolation for the sick and the handicapped. There have been well-documented miraculous cures. So on this feast, we should pray for physical healing. That is an act of faith in a Jesus who came "to save the lost and the sick." However, the message of Lourdes goes far beyond physical healing. Our Lady brings about in us a healing of the heart, where Jesus most wants to touch us all. This Mass will be *Livestreamed*.

A Note about Becoming Sponsors For Baptism and Confirmation

It is a great honor to be asked to be a sponsor for Baptism or Confirmation. The role of a “godparent” is to be an “other parent” in matters of our holy Faith. That is why sponsors must be **practicing Catholics, 16 years of age or older (14 years old in the Archdiocese of New York), having received Catholic Confirmation and currently living a good Christian moral life. If the sponsor is married, that person must be in a valid Catholic Church marriage.** One sponsor is required for Confirmation. It is customary to have two for Baptism, in which case one must be male and the other female. Parents may not be sponsors. A baptized non-Catholic may replace the second Baptism sponsor as a Christian witness. Non-Christians may not be Sponsors. Former Catholics may not be sponsors.

A nominated sponsor is asked to get certification from his/her current parish. This is a declaration by a priest/deacon that the individual is qualified to be a sponsor according to Church Law. To be so certified, the individual must be a **current parishioner of the particular parish where the certification is being sought, and be known to the priest/deacon as being a faithful practicing Catholic, attending Mass there weekly.**

Those away at college or graduate school or in the military should seek certification from their campus ministries or chaplains.

Unfortunately, at times, family members or friends are chosen to be sponsors with good intentions, but are found to be ineligible according to Church Law. Also, more and more, people seem to think that they are still “parishioners” of their childhood parish, where they attended school or received sacraments years ago, while no longer living in the area or attending Mass there regularly. **It is important for all individuals to be active members of their local Catholic faith communities.**

Here, at Seton, Certificates of Sponsorship are given by the pastor to registered members of the parish who are practicing Catholics, and who meet the above criteria. Please see the pastor after Mass on Saturday evening or Sunday to inquire about getting a certificate.

Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health

BACKGROUND:

Mississippi's Gestational Age Act protects the health and wellbeing of pregnant mothers, the life and dignity of unborn children, and the integrity of the medical profession by limiting abortions after 15 weeks gestational age except in medical emergencies or for severe fetal abnormality. By 15 weeks, a baby has a heartbeat, can move and kick, can sense movement outside the mother's womb, has eyes and eyelids that are beginning to open, can hiccup, and can hear her or his mother's heartbeat. The people of Mississippi understand that life is a human right and every life deserves to be protected. So, they chose to pass a law to protect unborn children and their mothers. Mississippi's law is consistent with what more than 90% of countries worldwide already do. In fact, the United States is an extreme outlier in abortion law and policy, being one of only four countries, including China and North Korea, that allows the abortion of a child any time during a woman's pregnancy.



Shortly after Mississippi's law was enacted in 2018, the only abortion clinic in Mississippi challenged the law. On May 17, 2021, the Supreme Court granted review of *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization*. The specific question the Court will answer is whether a state may enact limits on abortion before viability, *i.e.*, when the baby is capable of living outside her mother's womb. The Supreme Court will consider the correctness of its previous rulings in *Roe v. Wade* and *Planned Parenthood v. Casey*, which severely limit the ability of states to protect their interests in unborn life and maternal health. Notably, the State of Mississippi explains in its brief that neither the right to an abortion nor a viability line have any basis in constitutional text or history, and that the medical research into fetal development over the last half century establishes that states have a compelling interest in protecting unborn life at 15 weeks.

More than 80 friend-of-the-court briefs were filed with the Supreme Court in support of the Mississippi law—exceeding the amicus brief filings in an average case multiple times over and resulting in the most amicus briefs ever filed in support of a pro-life law.

THE BOTTOM LINE:

The U.S. Supreme Court should affirm that life is a human right and uphold Mississippi’s law.

Timeline of Mississippi’s 15-Week Law Protecting Life and Women’s Health

January-March 2018	Mississippi legislature introduces, debates, and passes 15-week law (HB 1510)
March 19, 2018	Mississippi Governor Bryant signs HB 1510; Mississippi’s lone abortion clinic immediately sues to block enforcement
March 20, 2018	Federal district court in Mississippi temporarily blocks law
November 20, 2018	Federal district court rules that Mississippi law is unconstitutional
